Zebra Child Protection Centre Facility Dog, Wren, Retires

Zebra Centre releases 2019 Statistics

EDMONTON, **AB** – In 2019, the Zebra Child Protection Centre supported 2,362 children and youth, which was a 12.6 per cent increase compared to 2018 where 2,098 children were supported. "Supporting 2,362 children and youth requires a lot of resources. Without our onsite partners we would not be able to provide an exceptional level of customized care and support that we strive to give each child and youth that comes to the Centre," says, Cheryl Diebel, CEO, Zebra Child Protection Centre.

A critical part of the support children, youth and their families experience are the Very Important Paws (VIP) program, which includes trained facility dogs, Wren and Fletcher. Wren and Fletcher met with children and youth 536 times in 2019. In the spring of 2015, Wren made history in Edmonton Law Courts as the first facility dog allowed to support a child on the stand while giving a testimony. Throughout 2019, Wren supported children, youth and their families 265 times. Wren will celebrate her retirement on February 27, 2020.

The caseload at the Zebra Centre has been increasing year over year, but we don't believe this is necessarily attributed to an increase in child abuse within our community rather it signifies a change within our community members recognizing the moral and legal obligation to report abuse. The Edmonton community continues to show us their dedication to a future where child abuse is not tolerated and with 112 volunteers in 2019 they helped us deliver our programs and services by donating 5,849.1 hours to the children, youth and families that we support.

In 2019, the Zebra Centre saw a 7.1 per cent increase in new cases with 94 per cent being police referrals. With onsite partners at the Zebra Centre, 1,169 forensic interviews were conducted in a space that is safe and comfortable for children, youth and their families. 768 interviews by EPS members, 385 by RCMP members, eight by Edmonton Region Children's Services and six by Integrated and Rural Police Organizations. "The Zebra Child Protection Centre provides crucial support to some of the most vulnerable children and youth in our communities," says Dale McFee,



Chief of the Edmonton Police Service. "Each partnering agency brings a unique set of skills to the table to ensure every case is addressed in the most supportive manner. This is an example of an integrated business model that actually works and demonstrates what can be accomplished when we all work together."






2019 Demographics


